Course Description:

This course is designed to present the student with a solid introduction to contemporary moral problems and ethical theories in their relation to our life and society. Emphasis will also be placed on the basic elements of ethical reasoning and argumentation and how these, along with ethical theory, can be used to solve (or attempt to solve) ethical conflict and dilemmas in our life. To deal seriously with ethical issues we need to see argumentation as more than just mere opinions. In order to facilitate lively and pointed discussion we will cover the basics of ethical theories.

Course Requirements:

1- Class attendance and participation is mandatory: Students should arrive at class having carefully studied the assigned text and prepared to discuss it.
